Please keep Salma and her parents in your thoughts and prayers, as we go through the steps necessary to try to help bring this beautiful young child back into the wonderful world of sound. What would it be like to get on your GoldWing and ride down the street and not be able to hear the roar of the engine, or the wind whistle as you ride along the Blue Ridge? Just think -- and then be thankful!!!!

If you have a cell phone, we could use that early to get it into the contact list for Saturday. We'd like to hand out your shirts early so if you decide to wear them for the walk, you'll have them with you. Sign Set Up - Meet at the side parking lot by Dominion Power downtown between 8th & 9th Streets at 6:30pm on Friday, April 4<sup>th</sup> if you can make it that early. Meet at the same parking lot at 8:00am on the morning of the 5<sup>th</sup> if you'd like to ride the route and see what changes were made from last year. Due to the swaying of the walk bridge with so many participants on it at one time, it has been completely removed and the mile will be

tacked on to the end of the walk. If you are interested in doing the MS Walk again, please let us know.

### **How safe is your First Aid Kit? by Diane Flourney**

It is almost SPRING and we are all getting ready to really ride the road. You've done your end of winter checks to make sure the bike is safe to ride. The tires look good, the brakes are working, and the lights are bright. Did you check your first aid kit for more than to see if it was in its where it was supposed to be?

First Aid Kits are essential when traveling on the road. Most all of us have them in some fashion or another. They range from the small drugstore "everything in a six inch box" type to more sophisticated put it together yourself types. Regardless of size, shape, and content, when is the last time you actually checked on what is inside? A First Aid Kit with no Band-Aids won't be of much help to even the smallest of cuts or scrapes. Did you know that Band-Aids could go bad? No, they don't turn up looking like spoiled cabbage but if the seals are cracked they are no longer sterile and mold spores and other bacteria can get inside. Now instead of putting on a sterile bandage to keep the cut clean you are actually putting bacteria over an open wound.

There are some simple things to look for when checking over your Kit.

**Band-Aids** – Every Band-Aid manufacturer ads the disclaimer "Sterility guaranteed unless wrapper damaged or open." Check your Band-Aids to see that they are all still tightly sealed. No cracks or tears. If they are not in good shape pitch and replace. While you're at it make sure you have a variety of sizes and have replaced those that have been used.

**Sterile Dressings and Gauze** – Same as the Band-Aids. Just remember that once you open a roll of gauze, it is no longer sterile. Should you immediately throw away the remaining gauze roll? Not really. Generally speaking you will put some sort of sterile cover over the wound before you wrap in gauze. Gauze can also be used to wrap a splint so it has non-sterile uses. However, putting it in a zip lock type bag will keep the remaining part of the roll clean and ready for the next use.

**Antiseptic and Alcohol Wipes** – Every individual wrapper carries a code on it to tell when it was made. Unfortunately, unless you know the code it doesn't help you much. However, these types of aides have built in protection. If the seal has been broken it will simply dry out and become unusable. Simply check to make sure that you have cleansing pads that are sealed.

**Bandage Tape** – This is generally not a sterile item, as it does not go directly on the wound. It can become dry rotted and loose its adhesive qualities. This is true whether you have paper, plastic, or silk tape. Pull out a piece of tape a couple of inches long. Pull straight out on the ends with a steady tension. Even paper tape should resist a fair amount of tension before it separates. If you can give it a gentle tug and it falls apart it is probably time to replace it.

**Ointments and Creams** – Even the smallest quantity in an individually sealed packet must have an expiration date on it. That's the law. This one is very easy. Check the date. If it is expired or about to be expired, pitch and replace. I know, you are looking at the packet and saying "its still sealed so it must be OK." Nope, not necessarily, many of these products have a "life-span" even when they are sealed. In most cases they won't hurt you but if they have lost their effectiveness, they aren't going to do anything for you either.

Tablets, Capsules, etc – These carry the same FDA law as the ointments and creams. Everything must have a date on it. If it is out of date get rid of it. One other reminder for when you are replacing these. I checked several brands of first aid kits. In every case, the manufacturer included a decongestant tablet. In every case, it was the non-drowsy variety. Make sure you do the same when you replace these items.

Scissors, tweezers, etc – If you can put it in a baggie and still fit it in your kit it helps to keep them clean. Otherwise just remember to take one of those sterile wipes you already checked and wipe off your instrument before using.

Latex Gloves – Been in that old film canister for awhile? These should be replaced every year. Latex dries and cracks unless you have the type that is sealed in individual wrappers. With individual packets you can check the dates and the packets like anything else.

In addition to the basic First Aid kit, most of us can locate a few Over the Counter medicines that we don't travel without. Tucked away in a small space somewhere many of us have our preferred headache, sinus, and cold remedies available should we need them on the road. These may not be individually wrapped items. We tend to take our big bottles and make little bottles and sometimes we even mix them all into one bottle. Check the dates on your big bottles as you fill up for the trip. You can take the earliest expiration date and with a permanent marker, write in on your travel bottle. That way you know if everything in your home remedy kit is safe and effective.

Taking the time to do these things helps make sure that the minor mishaps and illnesses that can happen on the road are treated safely and effectively.

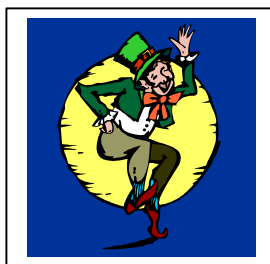
